Thirty medical professionals and dozens of agro-dealers, united under one cause—safer farming for healthier communities



In Narok County, we gathered for two transformative days of learning with a rather unique mix of participants—thirty medical professionals and dozens of agro-dealers, united under one cause—safer farming for healthier communities.

Medics from five sub-counties, including casualty nurses, pharmacists, and public health officers, were sensitized on the basics of pesticide regulations, management of exposure cases, and the operations of the Poison Information Service Centre (PIC) at Kenyatta National Hospital. These professionals are often the first responders when pesticide exposure occurs, so arming them with the right knowledge can be lifesaving.

Meanwhile, agro-dealers—those everyday heroes who stand on the frontline with farmers—were guided on the safe handling of pest control products, the importance of using the correct pesticide for the right pest, and the critical role of promoting Integrated Pest Management (IPM). The room buzzed with questions, shared stories, and newfound understanding that safety is everyone's business—from the clinic to the shamba.



Wambugu Farmers' Field Day

Nyeri County once again played host to the annual Wambugu Farmers' Field Day, and the turnout did not disappoint. The atmosphere was charged with curiosity and ambition as farmers from across the region flocked in to explore new technologies and innovations. 7th CAC Africa

Summit

If ever there was a summit that mirrored the pulse of global agriculture, it was the 7th CAC Africa Summit at the Sarit Expo Centre. With participants from Kenya, Tanzania, Uganda, China, and India, the event felt like an epitome of the world's agricultural ambitions. Organized by the CCPIT Sub-Council of Chemical Industry in collaboration with aak-GROW and the Pest Control Products Board, it focused on enhancing global linkages to improve food quality, increase productivity, and enhance farmers' income.

Discussions revolved around pest control market trends, regulatory compliance, and opportunities for collaboration. China's influence in this landscape was unmistakable, holding roughly 45% of Kenya's pesticide import market, making it the largest supplier of pest control products in the country. underscores the importance of maintaining strict quality standards and robust regulatory oversight to ensure that imported products meet Kenya's safety expectations. The summit provided a rare opportunity for regional leaders to forge stronger trade links, discuss emerging pest challenges, and celebrate the role of science in securing our food systems.

PCPB CEO Mr. Fredrick Muchiri reiterated the link between food safety and the responsible use of pest control products, emphasizing the need to read and understand label instructions. He also shared how enforcement teams have now been stationed across all major border points to fight the illegal trade of unregistered products.

aak-GROW CEO Mr. Eric Kimunguyi built on this, urging for a cultural shift toward Integrated Pest Management (IPM) to reduce overreliance on conventional pesticides. The three-day event closed with optimism that compliance is not a burden but a gateway to better yields, safer food, and stronger market access.







